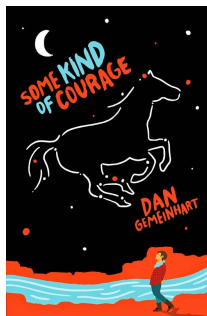


Soar by Joan Bauer

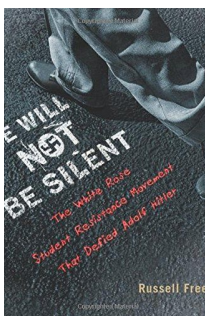
Some Kind of Courage by Dan Gemeinhart

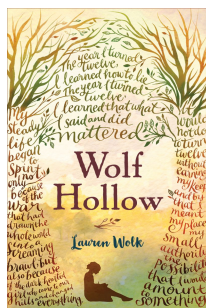
We Will Not be Silent by Russell Freedman

The true story of the White Rose, a group of students in Nazi Germany who were active undercover agents of the resistance movement against Hitler and his regime.

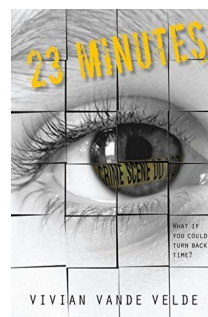


Wolf Hollow by Lauren Wolk

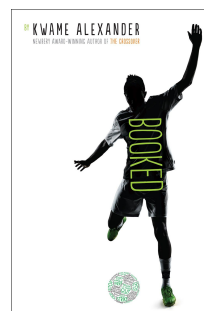


23 Minutes by Vivian Vande Velde

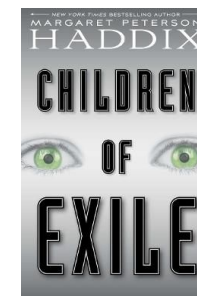


Booked by Kwame Alexander

Students: To be eligible to vote for your favorite book you must read at least **three** of the nominee titles. Voting takes place in February. For more information about the program, see a library staff member.

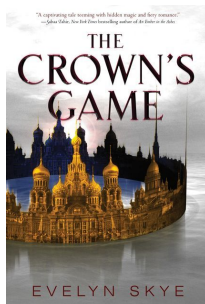

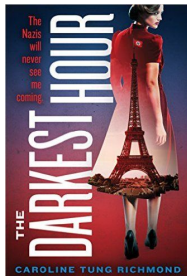
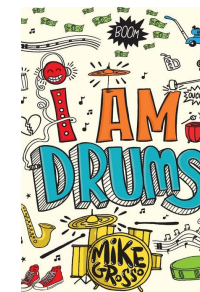
The Crown's Game by Evelyn Skye

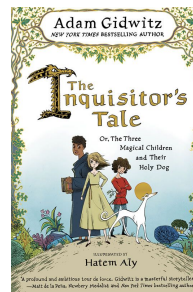
I am Drums by Mike Grosso

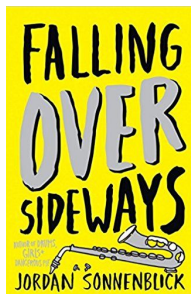


The Inquisitor's Tale by Adam Gidwitz

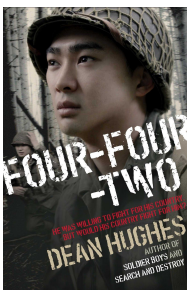
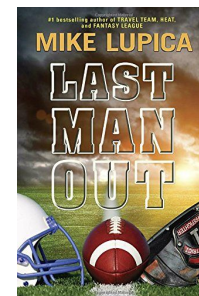
Falling Over Sideways by Jordan Sonnenblick

After her mother dies, Lina travels to Italy where she discovers her mother's journal and sets off on an adventure to unearth her mother's secrets.

Ghost by Jason Reynolds

Ghost, a naturally talented runner and troublemaker, is recruited for an elite middle school track team. He must stay on track, literally and figuratively, to reach his full potential.



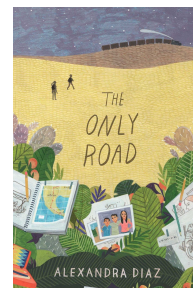
Mighty Jack by Ben Hatke
